## DEAR SISTERS AND BROTHERS

The month of September marks the end of summer and vacation time is over for the year. The last three day weekend and travel time for families, before or at the beginning of the school year, is Labor Day weekend.

Labor Day is an American federal holiday observed on the first Monday in September. It celebrates the economic and social contributions of workers. In 1882 Matthew Maguire, a machinist first proposed the holiday while serving as secretary of the CLU (Central Labor Union) of New York. Others argue that it was proposed by Peter J. McGuire of the American Federation of Labor in May 1882, after witnessing the annual labor festival held in Toronto, Canada.

Oregon was the first state to make it a holiday in 1887. By the time it became a federal holiday in 1894, thirty states officially celebrated Labor Day. Following the deaths of a number of workers at the hands of U.S. military and U.S. marshals during the Pullman Strike, a widespread railroad strike and boycott that severely disrupted rail traffic in the Midwest of the United States in June - July 1884, the United States Congress unanimously voted to approve the rushed legislation that made Labor Day a national holiday. President Grover Cleveland signed it into law a mere Six days after the end of the strike. The September date originally chosen by the CLU of New York and observed by many of the nation's trade unions for the past several years was selected rather than the more widespread International Workers' Day because President Cleveland was concerned that the observance of the holiday would be associated with the nascent Communist, Syndicalist and Anarchist movements that, though distinct from one another, had rallied to commemorate the Haymarket Affair in International Workers' Day. All U.S. States, the District of Columbia, and the territories have made it a statutory holiday.

The form for the celebration of Labor Day was outlined in the first proposal of the holiday. A parade to exhibit the "strength and esprit de corps of the trade and labor organizations",

When I left that ceremony I couldn't help but think what our world was like when they joined our Order and what challenges our country faced. One joined in 1960, that year that our Country saw the inauguration of our youngest President and we were engaged in a great scientific race between ourselves and the former Soviet Union to see which system of government would be the first to land men on the moon and return them

safety to earth. Would it be the Socialistic Communism of the USSR or the Capitalistic Democratic Republic of the USA? We were late to get started in this race when President Kennedy challenged us and we answered the call. As the world watched and the first man stepped onto the surface of the moon we heard the words, "one step for man, one giant leap for mankind" spoken in English. The USSR, like so many before them, failed to recognize the strength and power of a free people when called upon to meet whatever challenge they may face.

80 Years ago, 1940, the United States was just one year away from facing its greatest challenge since its founding. The free people of the world were threatened by the advance of Fascism in Europe and Imperialism in the Far East and Pacific. Once again America was called upon to join the fight to preserve freedom and those God given rights recognized in the Constitution given to all mankind. We as a country stepped up, sacrificed and with the help of God prevailed. This is who we are, this is our heritage and the dream of America and while we are human and in so many instances have not lived up to that dream, we continue to struggle and strive for the ideal. We must never let anyone or anything deter or weaken our resolve, whether it be from tyrants across the sea, insurgents within our own borders or a virus that threatens our way of life, we will face it and them and overcome because we are Americans.

followed by a festival for the workers and their families. This became the pattern for Labor Day celebrations. Speeches by prominent men and women were introduced later, as more emphasis was placed upon the civil significance of the holiday. Still later, by a resolution of the American Federation of Labor convention of 1909, the Sunday preceding Labor Day was adopted as Labor Sunday and dedicated to the spiritual and educational aspects of the labor movement.

The holiday is often regarded as a day of rest and parties. Speeches or political demonstrations are more low-key than May 1 Labor Day celebrations in most countries, although events held by labor organizations often feature political themes and appearances by candidates for office, especially in election years.

Forms of celebration include picnics, barbecues, fireworks displays, water sports camping trips, hot air balloon events and the like. Families with school-age children take it as the last chance to travel before the end of summer recess. Similarly, some teenagers and young adults view it as the last weekend before returning to college or university, although presently school start times vary.

Note of interest: President Stephen Grover Cleveland was 22<sup>nd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> president of the United States; the only president in American history to serve two non-consecutive terms in office (1885-89 and 1893-97).



Beginning in the 1950's (nobody can remember past that time) Colorado #2 had a pie booth during the Boom Days celebrations. A successful project during the 60's and 70's was the sale of commercial quality dishcloths. This was extremely successful because no one had dishwashers at that time.

Spaghetti dinners and pancake breakfasts benefited the Ronald McDonald House. Ongoing fundraisers were dinners served for Corinthian Lodge #35 and the Leadville York Rite Bodies.

For two years, the Chapter sold listings on Community Calendars. This gave way to the Christmas wreath and garland project which is the main fundraiser, which benefits the Dessie Powell Scholarship and Chapter expenses. This activity added \$3000 to the Chapter treasury last year.

Sister D'Ann Downing collected recipes to publish an Eastern Star Cookbook. This publication included the top secret and specialized recipes for Coffee Roast (Beef). The printing sold out immediately.

Finally, we need to recognize the most consistent and reliable fundraiser of all, namely the devoted members who include extra donations with their dues. One year events such as the Ghost Tea are always helpful, but the most reliable fundraiser of all are those extra donations with the dues.
