


I don't really collect cook books but have a few cherished ones. One is *Fruit Fixin's of the North Fork* which came from Paonia. I found this recipe for May:

VIDALIA ONION RECIPES - Courtesy of Pueblo #7

Pear Salsa

INGREDIENTS: 2 cups chopped Vidalia onions 1 cup diced unpeeled pear ¹/₂ cup chopped roasted red pepper (from a 7 oz. jar) 2 tablespoons chopped fresh jalapeno pepper 2 tablespoons chopped fresh cilantro 2 tablespoons lime juice ³/₄ teaspoon salt

DIRECTIONS:

In a medium bowl combine Vidalia onions, pear, red pepper, jalapeno pepper,cilantro, lime juice and salt. Serve immediately or cover and refrigerate up to 2 days. Serve grilled with seafood, chicken or hamburgers. Yields 6 portions, 3 cups. (Taken from vidaliaonions.com/recipes)

Vidalia Onion Casserole

2 large Vidalia onions, sliced thin and separated into rings (if they are smaller, use three) 1/2 cup butter, divided (1 stick) 1/2 tsp. seasoned salt 1/4 tsp. black pepper 1/2 cup sour cream 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese 1 cup shredded Cheddar Monterrey Jack blend cheese (can use all Cheddar) 1 sleeve butter flavored crackers, crushed (like Ritz or Town House)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Melt 4 Tbs. of the butter in a skillet over medium heat. Add the onion rings.

Sprinkle with seasoned salt and black pepper. Toss in the butter and saute just until they start to soften. Don't overcook them – they should still have a little texture after this bakes.

Add the sour cream and toss to blend. Turn the heat off at this stage. You don't want your sour cream to break.

Spray an 8x8 baking dish or a 1 1/2 quart casserole dish with nonstick spray. Layer half of the onion mixture in the bottom.

Sprinkle with 1/2 of the grated Parmesan and 1/2 the shredded Cheddar Monterrey jack blend.

Melt the other 4 Tablespoons of butter and toss the crushed Ritz crackers in it. Sprinkle half of the buttered crumbs over the cheese.

Repeat the same layers all again, ending in the buttered cracker crumbs. Place in a 350 degree oven for 30 minutes! (Recipe from: <u>https://www.sweetteaandcornbread.net</u>)

Vidalia-Honey Vinaigrette

Serve this over a salad of mixed greens, chopped apple, toasted pecans and dried cranberries.

Total: 3 hrs 28 mins

Yield: Makes about 1 1/3 cups

Ingredients ¹/₂ cup chopped Vidalia onion ³/₄ cup vegetable oil, divided ¹/₄ cup cider vinegar, divided ¹/₄ cup honey 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard ¹/₂ teaspoon salt ¹/₂ teaspoon pepper

Directions

Sauté onion in 1 Tbsp. hot oil in a medium skillet over medium heat, stirring often, 8 minutes or until caramel colored.

Add 2 Tbsp. vinegar, stirring to loosen particles from bottom of skillet. Remove from heat; cool 5 minutes.

Process onion mixture, honey, next 3 ingredients, and remaining oil and vinegar in a blender 30 seconds or until blended. Cover and chill 3 to 24 hours.
