

Oatmeal Raisin Cookies

1/2 cup plus 6T butter, softened 3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar 1/2 c white sugar 2 eggs 1 tsp vanilla 1 1/2 c flour 1 tsp baking soda 1 tsp ground cinnamon 3 cups oats 1 cup raisins

Preheat oven to 350. In a large bowl combine butter, and sugars on medium until creamy. Add eggs and vanilla, beat well. Add flour, baking soda, cinnamon and salt. mix well. Add oats and raisins. mix well.

Drop by rounded tablespoonfuls onto ungreased cookie sheets. Bake 8-10 minutes

Very simple, kid friendly and YUMMY! I glaze them with a paint brush.

2 cups flour
2/3 cup margarine
2 tsp cinnamon
2/3 cup sugar
4 eggs

Combine and cream butter and sugar. Separate egg whites and yolks. Beat egg yolks and add to butter/sugar mix. Combine flour and cinnamon, sift and stir into mixture. Work dough on floured board. Roll out and cut with star cookie cutter. Make at 350° until light brown (10-12 minutes). Cover with thin icing.

Here are some interesting facts about Christmas:


1. The tradition of Christmas trees goes all the



Hanukkah or Chanukkah?

No matter how it is spelled, it means the Festival of Lights, and commemorates the re-dedication of the Jewish temple in Jerusalem in 165 BCE (Before the Common Era) and is regarded by many as the First War for Religious Freedom. While it's considered a minor holiday on the Jewish calendar, it has become very popular in the United States because it occurs near Christmas time each year. It is not the Jewish Christmas. Yes, many families do exchange gifts, often comical, zany, fun or even silly things. And we will talk, and laugh, and have fun! This is a family-oriented celebration, and often non-Jewish friends are invited to participate, helping to light the candles, and enjoy the food and games.

Hanukkah is one of the late Jewish holidays to have been added to the calendar, and as a result, does not appear in the Torah since the events occurred after the Torah was written. (The Torah refers to the first five books of the Hebrew Bible, namely Genesis, Numbers, Deuteronomy, Exodus and Leviticus. The Tanakh or Hebrew Bible is the same as the Christian Old Testament)

The Story of Hanukkah: After several centuries of peaceful Persian rule over Palestine, Alexander the Great, between

336 and 333 BCE took over the Persian Empire which included Palestine as Israel was then named. Shortly after, Alexander died, and his empire was divided generals. among his Palestine (today's Israel)

came under the control of a Syrian-Greek

family who tried to make all their people follow Greek worship and customs, to make their subjects more loyal to them. Some of the Jews adopted some of the Greek styles, customs, names, clothing, philosophy, and even the language.

In about 175 BCE, Antiochus IV

Epiphanes gained control of the Syrian Empire. He became involved in many wars and decided to mandate that all his subjects live according to

his Greek ways, which he thought would make them more loyal and less likely to revolt while he was busy fighting. He outlawed the Jewish religion, and in 167 BCE went so far as

desecrate the Holy Temple in Jerusalem by having an altar to Zeus placed there and ordered pigs to be sacrificed there (this last item was a tremendous attack against the Jewish

religion and Jewish dietary rules). An immediate rebellion broke out, led by the elderly Jewish priest Mattiyahu and his five sons, one of whom, Judah Maccabee ("the Hammer"), took over the rebellion after his father died. The family was called the Maccabees or the Hasmoneans. In 165 BCE, the vastly outnumbered Jews managed to defeat the Syrian army and were able to re-enter Jerusalem, ready to worship in their own way.

When they went to the Temple, they found it had been used as a pigsty and was in terrible condition. They cleaned and restored the Temple for rededication. To make the Temple holy again, the eternal light (Ner Tamid) had to be lit once again but that required specially prepared oil. The Temple was searched but there was only one small

flask of pure holy oil to be found. This was just enough to keep the light burning for one night. The priests left the light burning while they prepared a new supply of oil. However, according to legend, the next day the light was still burning. The light burned on for eight days without replenishment. (Not only do synagogues always have an eternal light (Ner Tamid), but many Christian churches also have them.) Since that time, Hanukkah has been a source of inspiration and encouragement to persecuted George Washington said that he had studied Judas Maccabees' guerilla tactics when he led the Continental army during Revolutionary War.

Tonight (Nov.28), members of my family will gather at our house, it will be the 1st Hanukkah for my 1st great grandson who is just a little more than two months old. We will

once again celebrate the



Festival of Hanukkah (aka Chanukkah) by lighting the first candle on the Hanukkiah (a special 9-branched candelabra, with eight candles representing the eight days the oil burned without replenishment and

one for the Shamash or "helper" that is used to light the other candles). Tomorrow night, we'll light two candles, adding one candle each night until on the last night we light all 8 candles. They are allowed to burn each night until the candles are completely consumed. By the way, we don't always use candles, many Jews use olive oil instead, or both. Sometimes everyone brings a

Hanukkiah to celebrate with, some with candles, some with oil.



As the Hanukkah lights burn, we will sing Hanukkah songs, play games (like dreidel spinning) for candy, such as "gelt" which are chocolate pieces wrapped up to look like gold coins. Others

will play family games. I suspect my youngest granddaughter, when she arrives from out of town, will be carrying a chess set and looking to beat me. It's also customary to listen to Jewish music, especially by Jewish singers or musicians. There are traditionally special foods that are eaten: Latkes (potato pancakes,) cooked in oil, or


other fried foods reminding us of the single cruse of oil found in the ancient Temple. Of course, other things can be used for latkes, I have

tasted some amazingly delicious non-potato latkes with sweet jellies, jams or special toppings on them. And another similar dish is jelly donuts, as well as small challah bits stuffed with cranberries or similar items, selections of cheeses and other dairy items. As I mentioned above, Hanukkah is a family-oriented holiday meant to bring family and



friends together in joyous celebration.
