BROTHERS NIGHT PROGRAM

Instructions: Need 6 Brothers

All Brothers take their positions at the same time. One in the East and one Brother stands besides each star point chair, outside the Labyrinth. The Brother in the East speaks first, as indicated. As each Brother gives his part, the appropriate star point rises and faces the Brother. At the end the Brother presents the star point with a flower appropriate to the color of the station. The star point resumes her chair and the next Brother follows the same procedure.

1st Brother:


