Worthy Matron speaks:



Officers are called as follows: Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Associate Matron, Associate Patron, Conductress, Associate Conductress, Secretary, Treasurer, Marshal, Chaplain, Adah, Electa, Ruth, Martha, Esther and Warder.

As soon as officers are in line, Fig. 1, line of march is followed. Fig. 2 and Fig. 3, marching by twos, each officer with friend. Officers stop at stations as indicated by (x), and each officer remains standing with friend until Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron are escorted to the East. Officers then bow to friend, friends take stations and officers are seated.

Officers may carry candles and extinguish them as soon as friends are escorted to stations, if desired.

The following song is sung as soon as friends assume stations.
