At our last meeting, we were thrilled to initiate three new members!



Dill Pickle Salad

½ lb dry shell pasta (about 3 cups) 2/3 cup diced chedar cheese

3/4 cup sliced pickles 1/2 cup pickle juice

2 tablespoons fresh dill

3 tablespoons finely diced white onion

Instructions:

- 1. Boil pasta al dente according to package directions. Run under cold water to stop cooking.
- 2. Toss cold pasta with about ½ cup of pickle juice and set aside for about 5 minutes. Drain and discard pickle juice.
- Combine all dressing ingredients in a small bowl and mix well.
- 4. Toss all ingredients in a large bowl. Refrigerate at least 1 hour before serving.

Dressing:

2/3 cup mayonnaise 1/3 cup sour cream 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper 4 tablespoons pickle juice

Salt and pepper to taste



Since our focus is all financial, we look at both short term (are the bills accurate and are they paid, do we have enough money in the bank to cover our upcoming expenses) to longer term matters such as "How do we finance and control the cost of holding a Grand Chapter Session this year and what mechanism can we use working with upcoming Grand Line Officers to control costs and fund future Grand Chapter Sessions." "How do we hold future grand sessions" with issues such as increasing hotel and meal costs, decreasing attendance while being required to remain in the Metro area per the Bylaws. Most hotels are not interested in hosting our event so the prices just keep going up. We have discussed ways to resolve, and all of them have good and challenging aspects. Following are a few of the options we are considering:

- 1. Modify the bylaws to allow us to gather anywhere in the state where we might find less expensive accommodations and meal prices. This option would allow us to be more efficient no matter what kind of session we decide to pursue.
- 2. Changing the way we do grand chapter and hold our sessions in a large chapter room or other non-hotel facility.

The good news is that our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron are committed to holding a Grand Chapter Session in September of 2021 and the Board is working closely with them to negotiate the expenses of the Session and identify a venue that will allow our membership to be excited about coming together once again after the seclusion of the pandemic. We are all very excited about the possibilities of 2021.

Other exciting news is that while we were all isolated a few of our members have been working on updates to the https://oes-colorado.org/ web site. The home page is open to anyone and contains information about the order that we hope will be of interest to potential new members as well as to our membership. The members only section (which will require a login and password) is moving forward quickly and soon we will be offering training for that section. If you have Grand Chapter pictures you could share for us to use on the home page, please send them to:

georgeb@bcconsulting.com. Each chapter will have a page in the member only section and it will be populated with the information in the green roster. If you would like additional information or a picture please send to georgeb@bcconsulting.com. We would love to have these updates complete by the end of April.

The other exciting news is that starting in April we will be hosting a "virtual race" to raise some money. We will be inviting you to get outdoors and walk, run or whatever. You will be able to do this by yourself or with a friend. Please be looking for more information on how this will work and get ready to enjoy the great outdoors.



The History of the

EASTERN STAR MASONIC RETIREMENT CAMPUS

This history is compiled from several papers and proceedings. Submitted and written by Jim Jarvis, PGP, and Vice Chairman of the ESMRC - Board of Trustees

The History of the "Home" began with a Right

"Whereas the Order of the Eastern Star has become well established in Colorado, and as one of the principal objects of the Order is Charity, I would suggest that a special committee be appointed by the incoming Grand Matron, looking toward the formation of some plan whereby this Grand Chapter of the subordinate Chapters, in connection with the Masonic Brotherhood, might accumulate a fund for the organization of a Masonic Horne for indigent

Master Masons, their widows, orphans, and Eastern Star Members. And as our Ritual teaches, 'the Order exists for the purpose of giving practical effect to one of the most beneficent purposes of Free Masonry, which is to provide for the welfare of the wives, daughters, and widows of Master Masons, 'now let us show 'that woman's heart beats responsive to the same inspiration that prompts man to noble deeds. During the past years, I have seen the need for a home or some temporary shelter for those who were worthy and who had a right to look to us for assistance, and it seems to me quite appropriate that this Grand Chapter should at this time take some action in the matter."



Twenty-five years later, at the Thirty Third Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Colorado, an amendment to the By-Laws was proposed for the purpose of establishing and maintaining a Home for the aged members of Chapters in this Grand Jurisdiction. Following the approval of the By-laws amendment, a Board of Three Trustees was elected to manage the program of building the Eastern Star Horne.

In November of the same year, Brother Robert Russell, a member of Weston Lodge #22 A F. & A.M., located in Littleton, CO, saw the opportunity for his dream of a home for the aged and indigent members of the Masonic Fraternity to become a reality. He donated 800 acres of his University Ranch to the Masonic Grand Lodge of Colorado and the Grand Chapter of Colorado, OES, with the stipulation that a Home be erected no later than July 1, 1927. Due to insufficient building funds, Mr. Russell granted an extension to the Grand Chapter so that funds could be raised. This was the beginning of an effective fundraising campaign by members of Eastern Star. Many chapters and individuals worked diligently to raise funds to build the Eastern Star Home. On October 2, 1925, the Matrons and Patrons of Denver Chapters met and formulated plans for a Grand Ball to raise funds for the OES Home Fund. They netted \$3,580.91. Each year the Annual Ball was held and averaged approximately \$3,500.00.

The Board of Trustees (BOT) let the contract for the foundation of the Home, on September 2, 1930, and September 18, 1930, the cornerstone was laid by Horace H. Mitchell, Most Worshipful Grand Master, assisted by Worthy Grand Matron (WGM) Sister, Irene L. Ellwanger, and Worthy Grand Patron (WGP), Guy M. Hanner. Mr. Russell was present at this occasion but no amount of persuasion could induce him to lay aside his modesty and be presented so that due credit for his generosity might be accorded him.

The 1931 proceedings reported the cost of the building to be \$54,976.43. The structure was designed in Early English Architecture. The Home consisted of 17 single rooms and 5 double rooms, accommodating 27 guests. On the first floor was a large living room, dining room, and kitchen, plus the Matron's living quarters and some guest rooms. The second floor contained guest rooms, the infirmary, a sun porch, a lounge, and a balcony. The basement consisted of a Chapter room, laundry room, sewing room, three live-in rooms for employees, three storage rooms, a root cellar, and the heating plant.

The Home was dedicated on September 13, 1931, by WGM, Kate C. Adams, and WGP, J. Fred Kamm. The Home officially opened on September 28, 1931, with 12 guests who had been approved by the Board of Trustees. The Home as self-sustaining for many years. The land surrounding the Home was used to produce grain and for grazing of the livestock. The items produced on the farm were consumed by the residents and some sold for other sources of income.

As the years passed, applications for admission to the Home exceeded the space available and in 1946, a Ways and Means Committee was appointed to raise funds for an addition. The groundbreaking ceremony was held, June 20, 1948, but due to insufficient funds, this addition was not built at this time.

By 1952, there was such an influx of applications, the Board decided to remodel the basement to accommodate some of those who were in dire need of a Home. The Chapter room was not being used and was converted into four single rooms. The rooms reserved for employees were unused for that purpose, making 7 rooms available to those on the waiting list.

The need for more rooms was still evident and the health and fire departments were frowning on residents living in the basement. Money-making projects were encouraged and by June 18, 1954,

there was enough money to have the second groundbreaking for the South Wing. Dedication for the \$75,000 South Wing was held June 19, 1955. The first level consisted of twelve private rooms, a bathroom, lounge, and patio. The lower level was designed as the residence for the manager. It was a two-bedroom apartment. Adjacent to it was a Board Room with. Manager's office and a storage room which was later converted into a bedroom.

In 1954, a Beauty Shop was the special project of the Worthy Grand Matron, Ella P. Todd. This shop was furnished by her project. Since this initial project, the Beauty Shop has been remodeled and refurbished several times. In 1972, Manzanita Chapter No. 85, purchased new equipment, and in 1983 the Friendship Matrons and Patrons (of 1980-1981) remodeled and repainted it.

In 1957, there were still more applications than rooms available. The WGM proposed a North Wing Addition of thirteen private guest rooms, a spacious hall, a small lounge, and a patio. The basement would be a large storage room and workshop. The wing was completed and dedicated by WGM, Geneva Archbold, on June 7, 1959, for \$68,000. At this time, it was deemed advisable to use the double rooms as single rooms and to discontinue using the basement rooms and move the guests to the upper levels. With the addition of more rooms, the kitchen, dining room, and living room were too small to accommodate the number of people now living in the Home. It was necessary to enlarge these areas which was done in 1959.

Realizing that an Endowment Fund should be established to provide funds for the maintenance of the Home, the Fund was established, August 1, 1958. Only the income from the Fund and none of the principal may be used. 10% of the income from the Fund is returned to the Principal Fund each year. In December 1965, a three-stop elevator was installed and in 1966 an underground sprinkler system was installed in the yard surrounding the Home. During the next several years, many smaller projects were accomplished; and, to comply with the Fire Department Code, the open stairways had to be enclosed to meet their regulations and certain doors had to be replaced with fire doors.

The waiting list continued to grow and in 1976, the East Wing of 10 large private rooms was started through the generous gift of Past Grand Matron, Grace S. Miller, of Lorraine Chapter #52 of Brighton. The lovely Chapel was incorporated into the East Wing by the estate of a member, of Radiant Chapter

No. 12; this estate had been designated for the Chapel.



The office of Grand Chapter had been located at 1614 Welton Street and was moved to the lower level of the new wing. Since the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer were responsible for keeping the books for the Home, it was nice to have all Eastern Star business together in one building.

When the East Wing was completed, all the furniture for Grand Chapter was refinished as well as two library tables, which had been in the Home since 1931. These tables are now in the lounge just outside the Chapel and the two lamps in the lounge were donated by Washington Park Chapter #126 in 1931.

The cornerstone for the East wing was laid on August 18, 1976, by Brother Jess Gern, Most Worshipful Grand Master. Sister Berniece Nickson and Harold Brown were WGM and WGP. The East wing increased the capacity of the Home to 55 residents. At the writing of this Part of our history, some of the rooms had been turned into offices, decreasing the resident rooms to 48. A four-car garage was built in 1977. Through the years the need for a shop was apparent and the garage is currently used for this purpose.

The Fire Department made their inspection in 1981. Since their last inspection, their regulations had changed for institutions, retirement homes, nursing homes, etc. Several items needed correction, they were: fire-rated doors in the original building; close all transoms above the doors; install a sprinkler system on the second floor; smoke detectors throughout the building in every room; a fire alarm system throughout the building to be connected directly with the fire department; and, the fire code for the kitchen was different and now required new fire prevention equipment. Although the changes were made, fire extinguishers are still required throughout the building. The cost of all these changes was very expensive. In 1982, Worthy Grand Matron, Helen Pierson's love project was an intercom system to each room from the Main Office.

There was money left to redecorate the Hall on the Second Floor.

Sister Betty Walker, WGM, and Brother Bill Parrish, WGP, in 1983 chose as their major project, the Home Endowment Fund. Their efforts, under the direction of Bill Carlson, netted \$22, 740. The Colorado legislature passed a statute governing Life Care Centers in 1981. This act imposed upon the Colorado Order of Eastern Star the responsibility to make changes in the legal and organizational structure of the Eastern Star Home. In 1983, a vote of this Grand Jurisdiction accepted the adoption of the Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws for Incorporation. The Amendments to the Constitution Governing the Grand Chapter of Colorado, O.E.S., reflect the necessary changes for the election of the members of the Board of Trustees. It was at this session that the delegate system was adopted.

At the offsite meeting of the Board of Trustees in October 1986, it was decided that the undeveloped land surrounding the home should be developed. Since several offers had been received to purchase this land by developers, it forced the issue of what should be done. The members attending this offsite meeting decided that we should attempt to develop the land ourselves. At the September 1987 House of Delegates (HOD) meeting, it was unanimously voted for the Board to proceed with their plans for the development of the land. The Ground Breaking ceremony for the Star Vista Village was held in

1988, with Sister Ruth Richard, WGM, and Brother Sam Holland, WGP, performing the Ribbon honors. The Cutting Ceremony for Star Vista Village was held on September 20, 1989, with Sister Judy Domenico, WGM, and Brother Lee Blooding, WGP, cutting the ribbon.

Those in attendance were members of Eastern Star and Grand Lodge. At this time, plans for 30 duplex units of independent living have been completed.

The Decade of Decision was a capital fundraising campaign the proceeds of which were to be used exclusively for the nursing care facility, the kitchen and dining room complex, and the remodeling of the existing Robert Russell Home. The campaign total was \$3,000,000.

In 1997, a special "Picture Us" photo album was sold and half the proceeds were donated to the

Endowment Fund. The Center opened their services to the Community and the Home was granted a license for HCBS (Home and Community Based Services) of 16 beds. As a licensed I-TBS facility, we could now accept Medicaid. At the Annual Meeting of the House of Delegates, the members voted to include representation from the Masonic Grand Lodge of Colorado. There are to be four members on the Board appointed by the Grand Master. January 1998, the Grand Lodge voted to join the Center.

In 2011 to keep the Home valuable in the Denver market we needed to upgrade the rooms after a study was conducted it was decided to add a new building. On September 28th we broke ground for the Mary Barry Building, that would contain 16 room in a Memory Care Unit, 44 rooms of Assisted Living, a new Kitchen and Dining Room, a meeting room, and a theater. The Mary Barry Building opened in 2014. In 2018 on the advice of the BOT's lawyer, that we should not allow the Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter to appoint or elect members of the BOT as this would open them up to suits against the Home. This move was to distance the Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter so if there is a suit against the Home. they would not be able to collect money from the Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter accounts. So now the HOD elects the members to the BOT from applications submitted by those interested in being on the BOT.


In 2019 the BOT started plans to replace the rooms in the Robert Russell Building the first phase

meeting. The BOT is now elected by the House of Delegates from those that apply. You can be a part of this by being on the HOD or submitting an application to be a member of the Board of Trustees, the application can be found on the website.






COLORADO OES CHALLENGE
