COLORADO #2 - LEADVILLE Robert Trezise, PP - Reporter

Third time was the charm!! Colorado 2 had official visit on June 9 after it had been postponed twice. Since Colorado 2 is celebrating 140 years of activity, the entertainment of music and history centered around this historical occasion. Sister Sandra Mark created table decorations of 1882 advertisements for a variety of questionable medical treatments, as well as the high fashion and society activities of that time. Sister Sandra also gave a wonderful presentation of a little of history of Colorado 2. It is printed below.

Colorado 2 will end the year with election and initiation. This will be a great start for 2023 OES projects and activities.

Colorado #2 Official Visit 140 Year Anniversary Celebration Leadville, Colorado June 9, 2022

On June 15, 1882, we know that our ancestral sisters and brothers of Colorado 2 were busy with the business of instituting a new chapter. But what else was on their minds? Like all of us today, they enjoyed the fellowship of the order but there were other things going on in Leadville, in Colorado, in the world. I have explored their Victorian world through the local and national newspapers of the day and would like to give you a flavor of what I found.

For example, we are troubled about the war in Ukraine—our sisters were worried about, as the headline said: "Indian Troubles in Wyoming". The article reads: A company of cavalry left Omaha yesterday for Fort McKinney, Wyoming. General Crook had learned that there were 1500 Indians on the Powder River below the fort. Stockmen had reported that they were killing cattle and threatening herders. General Crook deemed it advisable to send troops.

Another parallel: Russian President Vladimir Putin is generally not favorably regarded by us these days. On June

15, 1882, newspaper headlines reported that the Russian Czar has approved the formation of a bank for the purpose of facilitating the acquisition of land by the peasants. I wonder if our sisters viewed the news with skepticism or approval?

Our sisters didn't get to vote for 11 ½ years after the formation of our chapter. Even though our sisters couldn't vote, they probably followed the political foibles of the day. The paper reported on the House debate of the Bottled Spirits Bill that Rep Kelly had called Rep White a lunatic and a liar and Rep White had called Rep Kelly a scoundrel. Accusations and outrage went on and on. Some things never change.

Medical issues tend to preoccupy our thoughts and fears these days, and so it was in 1882. Our ancestors had access to cures and remedies of dubious value. My favorite is Dr. Dewitt's Syrup Tar and Wild Cherry the only positive cure for coughs and colds in this climate recommended by physicians, lawyers, clergymen, merchants, mechanics and miners.

I hope that you had a chance to exam the ads scattered around the dining room at dinner—ads for treating medical maladies as well as clothing merchants for the latest fashions. Ball's Health Preserving Corset ad was sort of a combination of the two, which included a long list of eminent Chicago physicians endorsing the corset.

And hats! Hats were must-haves for Victorians and Leadville ladies (not in Chapter of course) were "respectfully invited to inspect the elegant stock of Madamme Robitalle's Millinery Emporium: Parisian Bonnets, Opera Hats, Flowers, Plumes, etc, etc."

In the early days of Colorado #2 events were sporadically announced in the newspaper. Of special note was the following on February 11, 1891 Large headline: "Lovers of Terpsichore" "The ladies of the Eastern Star Lodge gave their first ball to the satisfaction of all. It was a most successful and enjoyable affair and nothing was left undone that would add to the comfort of the guests. A program of 17 dances was gone through, and professor Henry Simon's orchestra supplied the music." A long list of organizing committee members was given as well as those attending.

After 140 years and 3,435 meetings, thank you for a wonderful legacy, ancestral sisters and brothers of Colorado #2!

The designer of the 50-Star Flag lived in Lancaster, Ohio



In 1958, a history teacher assigned a class assignment to redesign the national flag as both Alaska and Hawaii neared statehood.

Robert G. Heft, who was 16 at the time, designed a new flag using the old 48-star flag and \$2.87 worth of blue cloth and white iron-on material. His design earned him a B-minus to which he challenged by sending it to Washington D.C. to be

considered by President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

According to his obituary, Heft was one of thousands to submit a flag design but he was the only person who actually stitched together a flag and shipped it to D.C.

Once the flag was selected, Heft's grade was rightfully changed to an A. His design became the official flag in 1960.

Did you know that we didn't actually declare Independence on the 4th of July

One of the greatest misconceptions of the 4th of July lies in the name and date. It is widely believed that America declared their independence from Britain on July 4, 1776. However, the official vote actually took place two days before and the "Declaration" was published in papers on July 4.

Americans Will Enjoy 150 Million Hot Dogs During the 4th

According to the National Sausage and Hot Dog Council (NHDSC), Americans are expected to eat 150 million hot dogs over the July 4th holiday. This is part of an estimated 7 billion that are expected to be eaten during the summer season from Memorial Day to Labor Day.

Only Two Men Signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776

Charles Thompson and the infamous John Hancock were the only two men who actually signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. The other 54 delegates signed over the course of the next month.

There is Something Written on the Back of the Declaration of Independence

... and no, it isn't a treasure map written in invisible ink.



According to the History Channel, a simple message is written upsidedown across the bottom of the signed document that reads, "Original Declaration of Independence dated 4th July 1776."

According to the same article, no one knows who wrote this or when, but it was believed to have been added as a label during the years of the Revolutionary War when parchment was frequently rolled up for transport.

One Signed Later Recanted the Declaration of Independence

Richard Stockton, a lawyer from New Jersey, became the only signer of the Declaration of Independence to recant his support of the revolution after being captured by the British in November 1776 and thrown in jail. After years of abusive treatment, and his recanting of loyalties, Stockton was released to find all of his property destroyed or stolen by the British. His library, one of the finest in the colonies, was burned to the ground.

The Average Age of The Signers Was 45 Years

Of the 56 signers, the youngest signers, Thomas Lynch Jr. and Edward Rutledge of South Carolina, were only 26. However, Benjamin Franklin of Pennsylvania was the oldest signer at 70 years old.

The Declaration of Independence Was Written on a Laptop

... Okay, not a modern laptop, but still. Thomas Jefferson drafted the Declaration of Independence on a writing desk that could fit over one's lap. This device was referred to at the time as a "laptop."



Men Love Fireworks... \$1 Billion Worth



According to the American Pyrotechnics Association, Americans spend more than \$1 billion on fireworks each year. Out of this, only 10% of firework displays are set off professionally, which probably accounts for the estimated 12,900 firework-related emergency room visits across the country.

According to Fortune Magazine, of those injuries occurring between June and July, almost 70% were experienced by men.

Fireworks = An American Tradition Dating Back to 1777

Fireworks date back as a tradition of Independence Day as early as the first anniversary in 1777. John Adams wrote in a letter to his wife, Abigail, that he wanted Independence Day to be celebrated with pomp, parade, shows, and "Illuminations." This original letter was written when Adams presumed that Independence Day would be celebrated on July 2.

On the second anniversary of Independence Day in 1778, American troops were fighting the American Revolutionary War. During this time, George Washington ordered a double ration of rum for American soldiers to celebrate the holiday with.

A Much Smaller Start

Although an official national census was not completed until 1790, the U.S. Census Bureau estimates that there were only about 2.5 million people living in America in 1776 when the Declaration of Independence was signed. As of 2017, it has grown to become home to 325.7 million people.

Wearing Old Glory Violates The U.S. Flag Code

How many of you own a flag t-shirt, beach towel, shorts, headband, or any other item that is representative of the U.S. flag? Turns out that you're in violation of the U.S. Flag Code. The U.S. Flag Code states that you are in violation if you sell or display any "article of merchandise ... upon which shall have been printed, painted, attached, or otherwise placed a representation of [the flag... in order to] advertise, call attention to, decorate, mark, or distinguish the article or substance on which so



placed." That being said, in this instance, the Flag Code is not enforced or even enforceable, so don't worry - you won't get arrested by the Flag Police.

Bizarre 50th Anniversary

Thomas Jefferson, 82, and John Adams, 90, both died on July 4, 1826 within five hours of each other on the 50th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.
