Let cake cool completely (you may refrigerate it to cool faster just cover well). Top cake with cool whip, decorate with candy & drizzle with caramel!!

MANZANITA #85 - LITTLETON Larry Wullbrandt, PGP - Reporter



Golden City Chapter #29 was issued a dispensation on February 22, 1896, officers from Radiant Chapter #12 and Golden Queen #4 conferred the degrees on 20 people. The Chapter was constituted in 1896. The charter was recalled in 1902, due to a lack of interest among the members. A number of people met on November 28, 1933 to consider starting up again and on November 1, 1933, about fifty interested prospects met in the Odd Fellows Hall, which could be rented for \$12.50 a month, heat and lights provided. A request for a dispensation was signed by 20 persons, and Mount Zion Chapter #133 was instituted on December 6, 1933 with 59 Charter members. The Chapter was constituted on October 19, 1934. It met in the Odd Fellows Hall at 1106 Washington Avenue from its instating until moving to the present Golden Masonic Temple at 400 Tenth Street in 1951.

The Chapter has a long history of support to Golden City Lodge #1. In 1936 they served a turkey dinner to the Lodge for 75 cents a plate (made a profit of \$135.75), and frequently serve the Lodge to this day. Donations have included a baby grand piano in 1955; new carpets (\$450 in 1956 and a new carpet in 2002); \$1,000 in 1959 and \$500 in 1961 for kitchen improvements; the painting of the mural in the fellowship hall; drapes (\$100) upstairs; clothes racks in 1962; drapes in the fellowship hall; a freezer and water cooler in 1964; an organ was donated in 1976; parking lot paving (\$500) in 1971; \$5000 in 2005 for the elevator, along with a new hot water heater and dishwasher; and the ice maker in 2008.
