Traditions of Easter

The Easter Bunny

According to some sources, the Easter bunny first arrived in America in the 1700s with German immigrants who settled in Pennsylvania and transported their tradition of an egg-laying hare called



"Osterhase" or "Oschter Haws." Their children made nests in which this creature could lay its colored eggs. Eventually, the custom spread across the U.S. and the fabled rabbit's Easter morning deliveries expanded to include chocolate and other types of candy and gifts, while decorated baskets replaced nests. Additionally, children often left out carrots for the bunny in case he got hungry from all his hopping. **Easter Eggs**

Easter is a religious holiday, but some of its customs, such as Easter eggs, are likely linked to pagan traditions. The egg, an ancient symbol of new life, has been associated with pagan festivals celebrating spring. From a Christian perspective, Easter eggs are said to represent Jesus' emergence from the tomb and resurrection. Decorating eggs for Easter is a tradition that dates back to at least the 13th century, according to some sources. One explanation for this custom is that eggs were formerly a forbidden food during the Lenten season, so people would paint and decorate them to mark the end of the period of penance and fasting, and then eat them on Easter as a celebration.

Easter egg hunts

and egg rolling are two popular egg-related traditions. In the U.S., the White House Easter Egg Roll, a race in which children push decorated, hard-boiled eggs across the White House lawn, is an annual event held the Monday after Easter. The first official White House egg roll occurred in 1878, when Rutherford B. Hayes was president. The event has no religious significance, although some people have considered egg rolling symbolic of the stone blocking Jesus' tomb being rolled away, leading to his resurrection.



Lamb and Other Traditional Easter Foods

Lamb is a traditional Easter food. Christians refer to Jesus as the "Lamb of God," though lamb at Easter also has roots in early Passover celebrations. In the story of Exodus, the people

of Egypt suffered a series of terrible plagues, including the death of all firstborn sons. Members of the Jewish faith painted their doorposts with sacrificed lamb's blood so that God would "pass over" their homes. Jews who converted to Christianity continued the tradition of eating lamb at Easter. Historically, lamb would have been one of the first fresh meats available after a long winter with no livestock to slaughter.

Easter Lilies

White Easter Lilies symbolize the purity of Christ to Christians and are common decorations in churches

and homes around the Easter holiday. Their growth from dormant bulbs in the ground to flowers symbolize the rebirth and hope of Christ's resurrection. Lilies are native to Japan and were brought to England in 1777, but wound their way to the



U.S. in the wake of World War I. They went on to become the unofficial flower of Easter celebrations across the United States.



Did you know? The largest Easter egg ever made was over 25 feet high and weighed over 8,000 pounds. It was built out of chocolate and marshmallow and supported by an internal steel frame.







The Story of Adah Submitted by Carol Heagney

As part of our initiation into the Order of Eastern Star, we are told the significance of the five heroines

in the Bible. The first Jephthah's being

Daughter, Adah.

As we are aware, the color of the degree is Blue and all Eastern Members know what

blue

symbolizes. We also know the

significance of the violet, the open Bible and the Sword & Veil.

So what really happened to Jephthah's daughter? In order to answer that question, we need to remember that the Bible is an 'Eastern" Book. It was written many years ago in the "East" which we now call the "Middle East." Because of this, there are many customs and idioms that are not familiar to the

"Western" mind.

To understand the Scripture, it is important to understand the Middle Eastern culture, it is in the understanding of the Eastern culture that we gain light and understanding of many things in the Bible.

In the book of Judges, you will find the story of Jephthah and his daughter. In the Bible, Jephthah's daughter does not have a name. The name Adah was given to her by Rob Morris, the founder of the Order of Eastern Star.

Jephthah was asked to lead Israel into war against the Ammonites. Because he didn't feel confident enough to win the battle, just before the battle, he made a vow unto to the Lord that if God would help him be victorious over the enemy, and if he were returned home safely, he promised that whatever came out of the doors of his house to meet him when he returned in peace shall surely be the Lord's and he would offer it up as a burnt offering. Jephthah wants to give God thanksgiving for the victory, but he does not know what to give Him and is leaving it up to God to take what He wants. The phrase "I will offer it up as a burnt offering.. comes from the Hebrew words alah, olah and means lifting up, ascending like smoke which most translations translate as burnt offering. However, when olah is translated to it's root definition it becomes "that which goes up" or is "surrendered to God." Then the phrase becomes "I will offer it up as a dedicatory offering.

We know that God gave Jephthah the victory. But it was his daughter who was his only child, who was the first to come out of the house to meet her father with timbrels and dances. At the time, It was customary that the women of the village would gather to meet their victorious men upon their return from war. So it makes sense that his daughter would go out to meet him.

Seeing his daughter, he immediately "rent his clothes: which means he tore his mantle which is a hooded cape. This was an outward sign of either anger or sorrow. In this case it was sorrow because he knew he could not take back the vow that he made with the Lord and he would have to give up his daughter.

He told his daughter that he had opened his mouth unto the Lord and could not take back what he had told Him. His daughter understood the importance of the vow and asked if she could first go and bewail her virginity by spending two months in

the mountains with her friends. To bewail her virginity meant that she would morn her impending lifelong commitment to celibacy much like the nuns of today.

When she returned, Adah wanting her father to be obedient to his word to God, told her father to do to her according to what he had vowed. There are two different meanings to burnt offering. One meaning is was to kill at the altar. Jephthah knew that killing his daughter as a burnt offering was against the law of God because God forbade human sacrifices. The other meaning of a burnt offering, is to give of oneself to serve in the Temple. It is referred to as a burnt offering because a young women given to serve in the Temple suffers because she can never marry or have children and carry on the family name. To not marry and have children was a great dishonor in Israel because marriage and Children are a sign of God's blessing.

Then it became a custom, that the women of Israel came to see her for four days every year to praise her and support her, much like a girls retreat of today.

By understanding the "Eastern": culture of the times, it makes sense to believe that Jephthah's daughter was not killed at the alter but was given to serve the Lord in the Temple and die a virgin.

When you are thinking about Jephthah's daughter, Adah and wondering if she really was killed by Jephthah, consider the following:

The Book of Judges never says that Jephthah actually killed his daughter.

If celibacy was not a long term consequence of the vow, why does the Scripture emphasize it by saying she was never intimate with a man?

Adah and her friends went to the mountains to mourn her lifelong celibacy and not being able to marry and have children, not to mourn an impending death.

If you were about to die, would you go off to a place of solitude like the mountains or would you go someplace with your friends and celebrate life?.

Jephthah only had one child, so he was very sorrowful, not because he was going to give her up to serve the Lord but because his family line would not continue.

God forbade human burnt offerings. Burnt Offerings were required to be Bulls, or male Rams, Goats or Lambs.

I found it interesting that the only people who wrote anything about Adah actually being killed were those of Masonic affiliations. All the theological people of many faiths said she was given up to serve the Lord, in the manner of a nun of today.

Given this information, do you believe Jephthah actually killed his daughter? That's for you to decide for your self.

Most of modern Kansas was part of the Louisiana Purchase in 1803, however southwest Kansas was still a part of Mexico, Spain and the Republic of Texas un the conclusion of the Mexican-American War in 1848, when it was ceded to the United States. Kansas was part of the Missouri Territory from 1812 to 1821. The Santa Fe Trail traversed Kansas from 1821 to 1880, transporting Manufactured good from Missouri and silver and furs from Santa Fe, New Mexico. Wagon ruts from the trail are still visible in the prairie today.

The first settlement of white Americans was at Fort Leavenworth in 1827. Kansas Territory, along with Nebraska Territory was established May 30, 1854 when the Kansas-Nebraska Act became law. Kansas Territory stretched all the way to the Continental Divide and included the sites of present-day Denver, Colorado Springs, and Pueblo. Kansas was admitted as the 34th State to the Union

on January 29, 1861.

Abilene, Kansas is the boyhood home of Dwight D Eisenhower, the 34th President of the United States. His Boyhood Home, Presidential Library and Museum was named the #1 Attraction in Kansas by USA Today.

Wichita is considered to be the "heart" of the Country, not only because of its geographical location but because of the genuine kindness and generosity of its people. Maybe this is one of the reasons the 2022 Kansas Grand Chapter Session will be held here.
