One of the places my son was instructed to find in his rally journey was the Kinzua Bridge in northwestern Pennsylvania. The bridge is described as "one of the World's top and most beautiful skywalks and viewpoints in the world." It has beautiful views of the Kinzua Gorge. The Kinzua Viaduct




was once the highest and longest railroad viaduct in the world. Why am I putting this in the article?, you ask? Well, in October, my wife Shelley, daughter Stephanie and I attended the National Police Week conference and ceremonies in Washington DC. After the completion of National Police Week activities, we planned on taking a few days to relax, and unwind from the very hectic last few months. We



wanted explore the area around DC as well as portions of Pennsylvania. The Kinzua Bridge was one of those out of the way places we visited. What a wonderful site, and the fall colors were spectacular.

We also enjoyed traveling to Harper's Ferry, and Shepherdstown WV, Gettysburg National Military

Park and other areas around Lancaster PA. While we at were Gettysburg, we found a Monument which titled "Friend to Friend". It depicts Confederate Brigadier General Lewis A. Armistead. Freemason, wounded after crossing the wall



during the climax of Pickett's Charge on July 3, 1863. The monument shows the General being attended to by Union Captain Henry H. Bingham, also a Freemason.

The story behind the monument goes that: Prior to the war, General Armistead served with Union, General Winfield Hancock in the Federal Army. They considered each other to be "valued personal friends." However, when the Civil War broke out, General Armistead refused to raise his sword against fellow Southerners and he joined the



Confederate Army in 1861. Both of the Generals were injured during the fight that day. General Armistead was left to the mercy of

the Union soldiers as he lay injured. During the lull after

the charge, a staff assistant to Winfield Hancock, Capt. Bingham of the Union, was riding past General Armistead who was lying on the ground where he fell. Capt. Bingham inquired as to who the



wounded Southern General was, and General Armistead himself responded. After some conversation between Capt. Bingham and General Armistead, Armistead discovered whom Capt. Bingham worked for, and that Capt. Bingham was also a Freemason. Due to this, Armistead entrusted his personal possessions, including a pocket book, a watch, his spurs, and a chain with a Masonic emblem on them to Capt. Bingham. These items were asked to be given to Capt. Bingham's superior officer, Union General Winfield Hancock, so that they could in turn be returned to General Armistead's family. General Armistead succumbed to his wounds, dying at Gettysburg on July 5, 1863.



This story epitomizes some of the most time-honored virtues of Freemasonry and highlights the unique bonds of friendship, which enabled these men to remain brothers

undivided. The monument was erected by the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania.

Another highlight of our trip was to attend the production of Queen Esther at the Sight and Sound Theater in Lancaster. The set was magnificent and depicted the beautiful story of Esther, found in our Ritual.

Just want to mention, some of the sites we



found around the Lancaster area were on the recommendation of our AGM, Beth Spangler. The area we visited is where Beth grew up, so we had insider information. Thank you to Beth for the tips. We enjoyed our time away, but we were happy to return home.

We hope you all have fun with the travel program, go explore and enjoy the journey. Be safe as you travel.

SNOWFLAKE #153 - WOODLAND PARK MaryKae Jarvís, PM - Reporter



October 5, 1961, a new Chapter in Colorado Eastern Star was Constituted – Snowflake Chapter No. 153. The process was started well before when a group of thirty men and women, dedicated to

the principles of Eastern Star, met with Worthy Grand Patron Lavern Plymel, with a petition to form the new Snowflake Chapter. On June 24, 1961, the Institution Ceremony was held at the Masonic Temple in Manitou Springs and a dispensation was granted by Lois Lord, Worthy Grand Matron, before an audience of some 250 persons. This was the first Chapter to be instituted in the Pikes Peak Region since 1903, some fifty-eight years later. Interestingly, that Chapter was Centennial Chapter No. 58.

Carolyn McAdams was installed as the first Worthy Matron for Snowflake Chapter, with M. Richard Elwell as Worthy Patron. Carolyn's motto for the first year of Snowflake Chapter was:

"Isn't it funny that Princes and Kings
And clowns that dance in sawdust rings
And even folks like you and me
Are striving with God for Eternity;
And each is given a book of rules
A pile of rocks and a set of tools
And each must build 'ers like had flown
A stumbling block or stepping stone."

The Chapters first meeting U.D. was held July 14, 1961 and their first initiation for four new members was done on July 28, 1961. August 11 and August 25, 1961 completed the term of the U.D work and the records went to Grand Chapter for approval. At the 'White Light of Promise' Session of the Grand Chapter of Colorado, September 20-23, 1961, Snowflake Chapter U.D. was granted its Charter having 52 names and had initiated thirteen members.

On October 5, 1961, the Constitution and Installation ceremonies were held for Snowflake Chapter No. 153 at the Shrine Club in Colorado Springs, with some 300 persons in attendance. A 'Winter Wonderland' theme was used with a large

golden circle in the East, the symbol chosen for the year representing endless friendship and harmony. Glittering 'Snowflakes', lavender and gold candles and yellow roses were also adorning the hall. Newly installed Worthy Grand Matron Pearl Stehley and Worthy Grand Patron Floyd Booth and their Grand Officer performed the Constituting Ceremony.

Worthy Matron Carolyn McAdams was a Past Matron of Radiant Chapter No. 88, St. Joseph, Missouri prior to serving as Worthy Matron for Snowflake Chapter. Carolyn wrote in the 'First Annual Report of Snowflake Chapter No. 153 O.E.S.', "As the last sixteen months are fast drawing to a close, I find my heart profoundly grateful for the experiences they have brought me. I remember that I took upon myself the duties and responsibilities of being the Worthy Matron of this new chapter to be organized, and adding the cares and duties of a Worthy Matron to those of a life already full, it would require a dedication of my time and talent that would take courage and sincere purpose."

Sister Carolyn closed her report with these words, "I feel that friendships have been formed that will last forever; ties have been strengthened that will never break. For the good my humble service has been to the Chapter, I realize there is much yet to be desired as the foundation of stepping stones has just been laid. My earnest efforts have been of loyalty to our great Order, dedicated to the principles of brotherly love, relief and truth."

"When I look back to the day I joined the beautiful Order of the Eastern Star, forty-four years ago, little did I dream the years and miles would allow me to serve as Worthy Matron in Missouri and Colorado. To all the member of my beloved Eastern Star, I give my deepest gratitude for giving me these memorable years. "Blest Be the Tie That Binds".' The Members of Snowflake Chapter, past, present and future, are indeed grateful to those who have

served, not only in starting this Chapter, but to serving this Chapter over the past 60 years. Here's to

60 WHOLE YEARS OF BEING AWESOME!



helped with the Session in many ways. Good times were had and many friendships formed. This group of workers refused to disband, so a social club was formed and they called it the Harmony Club. There were 50 charter members on the roll and membership reached over 300 at its peak. They met every other month on a Sunday at various chapters.

The purpose of the club was to promote friendship and harmony within the Order of the Eastern Star.

The attached gavel was presented to Harmony Club by Helen Decker, PGM, and Sponsor of the club. The above pin was worn by members and there was a small fine if you didn't wear it at the club meetings.

The remaining treasury of the club was donated to the Iva Mae Ryan Memorial and Glenn Monroe Youth Scholarship Funds in September 2021 after the club was disbanded

History of Veteran's Day

The first celebration using the term Veterans Day occurred in Birmingham, Alabama, in 1947. Raymond Weeks, a World War II veteran, organized "National Veterans Day," which included a parade and other festivities, to honor all veterans. The event was held on November 11.

At that time it was designated as Armistice Day. Later, U.S. Representative Edward Rees of Kansas proposed a bill that would change Armistice Day to Veterans Day. In 1954, Congress passed the bill that President Eisenhower signed proclaiming November 11 as Veterans Day.

Raymond Weeks received the Presidential Citizens Medal from President Reagan in November 1982. Weeks' local parade and ceremonies are now an annual event celebrated nationwide.






They renamed the town Bismarck after Prince Otto von Bismarck, who was chancellor of Germany. Town officials were hoping that the name change would draw the attention of wealthy German investors. The Germans were flattered but did not invest. Regardless, Bismarck is now the capital of North Dakota.

In California some executives needed the support of an influential banker named Ralston, so they declared that they were going to name a new town after him. Mr. Ralston said he was not worthy of the honor and declined. The executives, amazed at his modesty, named the town Modesto instead.
