raw white flour".*


*The pastor once again opened an eye to glance

Therefore, it was decided to try the restaurant type style again, so we have added a Cinco de Mayo Mexican Dinner to our lineup. It will be in May; details to come.



Potatoes Colcannon

4 russet potatoes (2 to 2 1/2 pounds),
peeled and cut into large chunks

Salt

5 to 6 Tbsp unsalted butter
(with more butter for serving)

3 lightly packed cups of chopped kale,
cabbage, chard, or other leafy green

3 green onions minced (about 1/2 cup)
(including the green onion greens)

1 cup milk or cream

1. Boil potatoes in cold water w/2 TBSP of salt until tender. Drain
2. Cook greens and green onions with butter for 3-4 minutes. Mash the potatoes with milk or cream and greens.

As I was perusing the Centennial Book recently, I found tidbits on ingenious methods of handling ballots for membership. Note - these instances occurred before the rules required three black cubes be cast for rejection.

- The husband of a member petitioned. The first ballot was not clear. When a second ballot was called for, a member on one side of the room rose, addressed the Worthy Matron, and asked that all members on this side of the room be excused from balloting. The request was granted and a member on the opposite side of the room made a similar request, which was also granted. The officers, in turn, went to the ballot box, tapped the top of the ballot box, but did not ballot. The ballot box upon being examined and reported in the West and East was declared clear. The candidate was never initiated because of a protest to the manner in which the balloting was handled.

- In another instance, after the result of the ballot was reported as not favorable, an officer rose and stated, "I made a mistake and dropped a black cube instead of a white ball so the ballot should be declared favorable." With no further comment or action, the Worthy Matron declared the applicant elected to membership .

- An unusual happening related to balloting happened when a collective ballot on a man and his wife proved unfavorable. They were then balloted on individually. The man received a black cube, and when balloting was taking place on the lady, her father, when his turn came to ballot, took a black cube, held it up and declared, "I'm sure my daughter

would not want to be a member if her husband cannot belong.” He then cast the black cube.

• In the days when many candidates were available, one Brother, who resented visitors and especially Official Visits, devised the following to upset everyone. Five candidates were balloted upon collectively. The ballot was not clear, thus causing each to be balloted upon separately. This time all ballots were clear, but considerable time was consumed as well as much anxiety caused. Afterward, he boasted of his deed.

Not making any judgements here; just sharing some recorded oddities which occurred during the first 100 years of Eastern Star in Colorado.

? DID YOU KNOW ?

February was the month known for a holiday known as President's Day. Here are some interesting facts about Thomas Jefferson



His portrait is on the \$2.00 Dollar Bill.

Thomas Jefferson was a very remarkable man who started learning very early in life and never stopped.

At 5, began studying under his cousin's tutor.

At 9, studied Latin, Greek and French.

At 14, studied classical literature and additional languages.

At 16, entered the College of William and Mary.

Also could write in Greek with one hand, while writing the same in Latin with the other.

At 19, studied Law for 5 years starting under George Wythe.

At 23, started his own law practice.

At 25, was elected to the Virginia House of Burgesses.

At 31, wrote the widely circulated "Summary View of the Rights of British America," and retired from his law practice.

At 32, was a delegate to the Second Continental Congress.

At 33, wrote the Declaration of Independence.

At 33, took three years to revise Virginia's legal code and wrote a Public Education bill and a statute for Religious Freedom.

At 36, was elected the second Governor of Virginia, succeeding Patrick Henry.

At 40, served in Congress for two years.

At 41, was the American minister to France and negotiated commercial treaties with European nations along with Ben Franklin and John Adams.

At 46, served as the first Secretary of State under George Washington.

At 53, served as Vice President and was elected President of the American Philosophical Society.

At 55, drafted the Kentucky Resolutions and became the active head of the Republican Party.

At 57, was elected the third president of the United States .

At 60, obtained the Louisiana Purchase, doubling the nation's size.

At 61, was elected to a second term as President.

At 65, retired to Monticello.

At 80, helped President Monroe shape the Monroe Doctrine.

At 81, almost single-handedly, created the University of Virginia and served as its first president.

At 83, died on the 50th Anniversary of the Signing of the Declaration of Independence, along with John Adams.

Thomas Jefferson knew, because he himself studied the previous failed attempts at government. He understood actual history, the nature of God, His laws and the nature of man. That happens to be way more than what most understand today.
