Here we are at the beginning of November and Covid-19 is still with us and our sky is filled with smoke from the many fires across our state. Our prayers are with those who have lost everything. Sometimes we take so much for granted until something devastating happens.

This was brought home last week by one of our subcontractors who creates beautiful dried moss creations and is working with us at the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Lakewood. She and her husband live in one of the burn areas and were told to evacuate. They gathered up the things they cherished most, their animals, and as much as they could pack in their vehicles and left their home. Last week they were told that their house was one of the ones that were destroyed in the fire.

Now I would like to share with you the contents of a phone call Ed received from her. The contents of that call and the expression of faith and hope is more inspiring and thought provoking than any sermon, speech or poem that I have ever heard. In that phone conversation, Ed expressed how sorry we were to hear of the loss of her home and belongings and, according to him, her response was so profound that it left him speechless; and believe me that takes a lot.

She started by thanking him for his expression of sympathy for their loss, but said it was not necessary because the fire had given her much more than it had taken. Yes, their house was gone, but they can rebuild and while the scenery had changed, the mountains were still there and life would soon regenerate and she and

her husband would be there to see it, learn from it and watch as nature re-creates itself in new and beautiful ways. Secrets revealed that could not be told until the old forest was burned away.

The fire had also forced her and her husband to reconfirm the importance of their life together. It showed them how important they were to one another and how much stronger they were together than they thought they were, and as they rebuild their home they will also rebuild their appreciation for one another. She said, “Sometimes, what we see in the moment as a tragedy happens, is actually a way of strengthening our spirit of hope and encouraging our faith in the wisdom of the natural world.” Most of all it gave them a new appreciation for the humanity we share; strangers reaching out to help, to comfort and to share hope.

She also said in that time of crises, for the first time in a long time, the fire forced her to look into the eyes, listen to the voices and connect in a very special way with strangers she had never meet before. She heard the urgency and fear in the voice of the deputy as he told them that they must leave their home to save their lives. It wasn't a fear for himself that she heard but the fear that he wouldn't be able to get the word out to those in danger. She remembered smelling the smoke on the clothes of the firefighter and felt the exhaustion in his spirit as he told them, “we couldn't save your house”. She remembered the hope and compassion in the eyes of the Red Cross volunteer as she took their information and helped them find a place to stay and assured them that everything was going to be alright. As the conversation came to an end she said not to feel sorry for them.

Now I know why Ed wanted to share this call with me and now I have shared the message with all of you and I hope you find this as inspirational and thought provoking as I did. No matter what life throws at us, how we react is up to each individual. We have the power to turn a tragedy into something inspiring. We have the strength to never give up and in so doing, give hope to others as they face their own challenges. It has been said that perception is reality. How we perceive our lives and the challenges we face is totally in our control. We have the power to change the negative to positive and find our own happiness.


I thought it was a great idea and after visiting with our WGP Bob and the Board of Directors, I was able to start making plans.
