The Order in Australia is governed by **The United Grand Chapter of Australia (UGCA)** with assistance from Governing (Supervisory) entities such as Grand Chapters and District Grand Committees at either a local or state level.

The term of office for the majority of all Chapters, Grand Chapters, and District Grand Committees is 12 months with the exception of The UGCA and the DG Committee of Tasmania which has a 2-year term.

A Chapter has 18 Office-bearers with the Chief Officebearer being the Worthy Matron. Grand Chapters and The UGCA have additional Office-bearers to share the administrative duties within their responsibilities.

Office-bearer Title	Duty/Responsibility
Worthy Matron (WM)	A Sister to preside over the Chapter
Worthy Patron (WP)	A Brother to support the WM
Associate Matron	A Sister to support the WM
Associate Patron	A Brother to support the WP
Secretary, Treasurer	Sisters or Brothers conducting the administration affairs of the Chapter
Conductress, Associate Conductress, Marshal	Sisters who support or facilitate the ceremonial duties of the Chapter
Organist, Chaplain	Sisters or Brothers supporting the ceremonial duties of the Chapter
Warder, Sentinel	Sisters or Brothers responsible for the security of the Chapter whilst in session
Adah, Ruth, Esther, Martha, Electa	Sisters representing the 5 Points of the Star, with each Point exemplifying the lessons of an inspiring story. These lessons remind members of their responsibilities to themselves, their families, their friends and the community

At Governing levels, Office-bearers with the same duties exist in addition to a few Administrative Assistants. The addition of a prefix depicts their responsibility e.g.:

- The Chief Office-bearer in The United Grand Chapter is the Most Worthy Grand Matron and all other Office-bearers are titled Worthy Grand Secretary, Worthy Grand Treasurer, etc.
- The Chief Office-bearer in a Grand Chapter is the Worthy Grand Matron and all other Officebearers are titled <u>Grand</u> Secretary, <u>Grand</u> Treasurer, etc.
- The Chief Office-bearer in a District Grand Committee is the Worthy District Grand Matron. District Grand Committees have 4 key Office-bearers ie. Worthy <u>District Grand</u> Matron, Worthy <u>District Grand</u> Patron, <u>District</u> <u>Grand</u> Secretary, and <u>District</u> <u>Grand</u> Treasurer. Committee membership is provided by elected members of Chapters within the jurisdiction of that Committee.

The United Grand Chapter of Australia is represented by 22 Worthy Grand Office-bearers who is assisted by various administrative officers and valued Emeritus Worthy Grand

Office-bearers. The term of office is 2 years with the Biennial Sessions held in June each year, and within in the State of the incoming Most Worthy Grand Matron.

Washington is the 18thlargest state, the 13th-most populous state and the 42nd state admitted to the Union on November 11, 1889. Washington is the largest producer of apples, hops, pears, blueberries, spearmint oil and sweet red cherries in the U.S. It is also the leading producer of lumber and ranks second in the production of Wine.

Question: What town canceled Thanksgiving because they couldn't make pumpkin pies?

Answer: Colchester, Connecticut

A frigid bout of cold weather in the middle of October led to the Connecticut River freezing, so settlers couldn't get their usual liquid sugar shipped on time from across the pond. Thus, the townspeople decided to postpone the holiday for a week in 1705. Colchester's town fathers postponed Thanksgiving because they couldn't hold it "with convenience" on November 4. The Colchester town records describe how they came to solve the problem: At a legal town-meeting held in Colchester, October 29, 1705, It was voted that WHEREAS there was a Thanksgiving appointed to be held on the first Thursday n November, and our present circumstances being such that it cannot with convenience be attended on that day, it is therefore voted and agreed by the inhabitants as aforesaid (concluding the thing will not be otherwise than well resented) that the second Thursday of November aforesaid shall be set aside for that service.

The tale of the Great Colchester Molasses Shortage became a food legend. Two centuries later, Rose Mills Powers wrote a poem about it for the July 1908 edition of Good Housekeeping Magazine:

Colchester housewives are glum and sad— Colchester housewives who should be glad— Baking and brewing for Thanksgiving day. What is the trouble up Colchester way?

Answer the housewives with streaming eyes, "No molasses for pumpkin pies!" The sloop that fetches the precious freight, Thanksgiving molasses, is late, is late, And how can Colchester celebrate!

Colchester housewives are gay and glad— Colchester housewives bake like mad. No feast decreed by the governor, this, But Colchester colonists shall not miss Their dinner, though late by a week and a day—

The sloop's in the harbor—Hurray! Hurray!

Thanksgiving molasses for all the town, For pies of pumpkin so rich and brown; Colchester folk at last sit down.

"C'mon harder." "It's too heavy! We Can't lift it. We gotta go for help! Hang on Chad, we'll be right back!"

Red Barns

Venetian red got its name because historically this pigment was produced from natural clays found near Venice, Italy. The clays contained an iron oxide compound that produced this red color.

But as people found similar iron oxide deposits in many other places, "Venetian red" became a generic term for light red pigments that did not have anyh purplish tinge. By the 1920s, such "earth pigments" used to make red paints were being dug in Georgia, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Alabama, California, Iowa and Vermont.

By the late 1800s, in addition to red, it became fashionable to paint barns with other color schemes, especially those designed to complement the architectural styles and finishes of owners' houses. These included various hues of yellows, greens, and browns. Also, white paint

commonly was applied to barns and houses.

But red paint remained popular on many farms because it was



the most affordable. In 1922, the Sears Roebuck catalogue offered red barn paint for just \$1.43 per gallon, while other colors of house paints sold for at least \$2.25 per gallon - nearly twice as much.

Today, many modern barns don't resemble



classic versions. Very large barns that hold hundreds of cows or pigs look more like hangars or warehouses and may be built of metal. But the tradition of painting smaller barns red continues - so strongly that the U.S. Postal

Service now celebrates them on postage stamps.
