Dear Sisters & Brothers:



On October 1, 1963, President John F. Kenney signed into law, the bill naming May 15 of each year as Police Officers Memorial Day, and the week that includes May15 as National Police Week. In Colorado, we set aside the first Friday in May to honor the officers, from Colorado, who gave their lives in the line of duty for the previous year.

The Colorado Law Enforcement Memorial is located on the grounds of the Colorado State Patrol Academy, in Golden. On May 6, 2022 there will be a Memorial Ceremony honoring the officers who died in 2021. In addition to the Memorial Ceremony, the Colorado Chapter of Concerns of Police Survivors will host a luncheon for surviving families and Co-Workers of those officers.

This luncheon is one of the events to take place in the state that is hosted by Colorado C.O.P.S.. Throughout the year, the survivors can attend other events to help them navigate their loss. In January, we host an after holiday party, providing lunch for the families as well as giving gifts to minor children. During the spring or summer a Spouses retreat is held, providing a safe place for spouses to share their stories and concerns and to heal from their loss. The first weekend in June, we hold a Family retreat, at the YMCA of the Rockies in Estes Park, CO. We have also hosted a picnic and fun event on the western slope for those survivors who cannot travel to the Denver area.

Colorado C.O.P.S also assists Colorado survivors in attending National Police Week activities in Washington D.C. Other sponsored events include: scholarships, peer-support at the national, state, and local levels, "C.O.P.S. Kids" counseling reimbursement program, the "C.O.P.S. Kids" Summer Camp, "C.O.P.S. Teens" Outward Bound Adventure for young adults, special retreats for spouses, parents, siblings, adult children, extended family, and co-workers, trial and parole support, and other assistance programs. There is an inherent need for a safe space to grieve and to process feelings and memories. C.O.P.S. programs are designed to allow participants to do just that. Through these healing Hands on Programs, honorable and special events, C.O.P.S. have helped families and co-workers navigate their grief, honor their fallen hero and connect with other survivors who have walked a similar path. Peer support is the heart of this organization. Survivors do not have to go through this alone. Money to fund these programs is strictly from donations and fundraising efforts. Please find it in your heart to support this fundraising event and the survivors of Colorado Enforcement Officers.



Bill Carlson, PGP is in a Rehab Center because he had appendix surgery on April 14th. Please keep him in your prayers.



“In 1920, the population of Aurora, Colorado was one 183 people, many of whom were connected with Fitzsimons Army Hospital. The Aurora Lodge #156 A.F. & A.M. was organized in 1922. Early in the year of 1925, members of the Eastern Star living in the area met with the help and direction of the Worthy Grand Patron of Colorado, Howard S. Bushnell, to formulate plans to organize a chapter of the Eastern Star in Aurora. Many members signed the dispensation that evening and when it was learned they were allowed to have 30 signers, 6 Masters Masons and 5 wives of Master Masons were made members “on sight” to fill that number. At a second meeting, the final business was settled and the first Officers were elected and appointed. Then on May 27, 1925, Brother Bushnell called a meeting for the purpose of instituting a chapter of the Eastern Star in Aurora. Inasmuch as Aurora is the Goddess of the Dawn, it was decided unanimously to name the Chapter Dawn with the emblem of the rising sun. At this meeting, the 30 signers knelt at the Altar and took the Obligation in the presence of a large group of visitors, including 4 Past Grand Matrons and 9 Present Grand Officers. Electa Chapter #60 of Denver conferred the degrees upon a class of 6 Brothers. Thirteen more petitions for the degrees were received and read.

The Worthy Patron-elect and several Masonic Brothers from Fitzsimons Hospital made our first Altar, Pedestals, Flower Baskets and Gavel. The Star Point chairs were a gift of Electa Chapter #60. Radiant Chapter #12 and Electa Chapter also gave Dawn a lantern slide projector which was used for many years. Later, we were able to secure a Signet from Manzanita Chapter #85 in Littleton, CO. Our present Signet was purchased by the Chapter in 1939. We borrowed the large chairs, Flag,

ballot box and carpet runners from Aurora Lodge until we could gradually acquire our own. Through the years, the Eastern Star Brothers made cupboards and cases to hold the paraphernalia. At the meeting of the Grand Chapter in Pueblo, CO in September 1925 by Sister Fannie M. Cline, WGM and Brother Leonard E. Wise, Acting WGP. Brother Leonard, throughout his life was an active “Daddy” of our Chapter.

The first Official Visit was May 18, 1926 and the Officers were complimented on the beautiful exemplification of the work, as they have been each year since then. On September 21, 1926, the Chapter was honored by a surprise visit of the Most Worthy Grand Matron and the Most Worthy Grand Patron. She gave a talk on the signs and passes of the Order.

Thus, Dawn Chapter, low on funds but high on enthusiasm and work, was launched. Four of the signers of the dispensation are still living and two of them, Arvin (Ted) Swedborg and M. Margie Swedborg, are still faithful and active members.

The early years were full of fun and surprises as well as well as a lot of work. Our meeting place was the old City Hall on the second floor and reached by . . . would you believe. . . a broad-stepped ladder nailed to the wall. The ladies managed to get up and down with the helping hand from the Brothers.

In 1930, the groups that met there got together and remodeled the room and built a ‘real’ stairway. Memories recall: The hot air furnace in the floor between the stations of Adah and Electa which had a mighty blast. This was to be carefully avoided when winding the labyrinth; How we ignored the weird sounds that floated up sometimes from the jail in the basement of the building; Remember the night we had invited the Rainbow Girls Assembly to exemplify their work? Someone had left the door to the bell tower ajar and we were invaded by bats; Or the warm spring evening when the miller moths hatched and the Star Points gave their lectures without missing a word, even though they had little millers fluttering around under their full skirts; Or the gas pressure stove, a gift of the Masons, which was such a joy to own. It had just one drawback – the Sentinel had to interrupt the meeting sometimes to ask for a quarter to feed the gas meter, so the stove wouldn't go out; Remember the night the Conductress lost her petticoat during initiation, stepped out of it and tossed it aside without losing a step. At the next meeting, she was presented with gift-wrapped safety pins in all sizes so it wouldn't happen again.

Through various ways of raising funds, including a large card party in the garage of the local Chevrolet dealer, we met our obligations and assessments in full. We were even able to purchase dishes bearing the Chapter emblem and 100 teaspoons. We had to wait for the knives and forks, however, they arrived two years later. We have dinners, held bake sales, cake walks, bridge and canasta parties and published cookbooks. The beautiful gardens of the members were the setting for Ice Cream Socials and Silver Teas. The troupe that gave the Minstral Shows became so good they were in demand for "ONE NIGHT STANDS".

Happy memories of the famous "Black Wedding" in which 73 Brothers performed under burnt cork or the night the Brothers gave their version of an Eastern Star meeting. What a mad scramble for large evening gowns and wigs. They were just 'lovely' and even their makeup was perfect. Did you ever try to cover up a moustache with makeup? Remember later on our very professional Kazoo Band which would perform at the drop of a hat and did just that at many surrounding chapters.

In the early years, our bazaar dinners had to be timed just right to miss the hunting season because most of the men in town departed to hunt and to take advantage of election time in order to swell the attendance with local politicians who came to do a little campaigning.

We survived these depression years because we had our Chapter and its members for our fellowship and recreation.

During the war years, our members were outstanding in volunteer hours to Fitzsimons Hospital and the Red Cross. We helped the families of the patients and stayed with them in their sorrow. We gave Jelly Showers to the National Jewish Hospital and cookies to the Veterans at Fort Logan. We also served as Hostesses at the U.S.O. and gave contributions to many causes including the Visitory Drive.

The Wi-Mo-Da-Si Service Club was formed. The name meaning Wives, Mothers, Daughters and Sisters of Masons. Although the Wi-Mo-Da-Si name has been lost, this club still meets once a month. For years they supplied cancer dressings and other comforts to Sands House. Now they spend hours making bazaar items and giving service in other ways. Their profits are graciously given to the Chapter to use for our many contributions. The Veterans Committee still goes to the "Closed Ward" at the Veterans Hospital for Bingo parties for the patients.

The OES Home Committee brings many programs and joy to the guest at the Home once a month. The Past Matrons and Past Patrons meet in fellowship at a monthly dinner.

In 1940, we received our 100% certificate in the National Eastern Star Temple. In 1946, Dawn Chapter instituted Aurora Assembly #53 and Bethel #35 International Order of Job's Daughters and Aurora Chapter – Order of DeMolay.

In 1948, the first husband and wife served in the East together and since that time, many more have shared that honor. 1950 was our Silver Anniversary, our 25th year in our old meeting room. The room was too small to hold the crowds, so we had our birthday dinner and official visit at the local high school. It was a beautiful year of silver and violets. Outstanding in memory was the garden party at the home of the Worthy Matron. The wisteria was in full bloom.

For many years, the Brothers of Aurora Lodge and Dawn Chapter had a dream of a Masonic Temple Building. Our two Georges; George Lord and George Stockman, who were on the building committee – pushed and spurred the dreams into reality. All of the Masons contributed either money or labor and Dawn Chapter contributed \$3,271.60 to the Temple Association as their part. Finally, on January 5, 1953, the dream was realized and we held our first meeting in this beautiful Chapter room. The Worthy Matron's opening ode was "Bless This House" as indeed we have had a blessed home. With the help of donations and projects, we were able to make the draperies and purchase new Star Point Pedestals. Together, with the Rainbow Girls, we purchased the Grand Piano. The bequest of one of the members allowed the Rainbow Assembly to purchase a small organ. Just recently, we were able to replace that one with the larger organ we have today.

Through the years, our growth has been healthy and productive. We initiate many candidates each year and in 1962 we initiated more than any other chapter in the state. We are still closely allied with our military surroundings; Fitzsimons Hospital, Lowry Field and Buckley Field, but it is our reputation of friendship and hospitality that brings many to visit or affiliate.

Our first Birthday Dinner was held in May 1927 for the members and their families. Each year at this time, the signers of the Dispensation and the Past Matrons and Past Patrons are honored. The attendance reflects our growth and fellowship.

In 1948, the Masons invited us to share a summer picnic and we still share this tradition each summer.

1975 was our Golden Anniversary. The Worthy Matron, through much research and planning, presented songs and memories from preceding years. The Past Matrons and Past Patrons who guessed it was their year, were escorted to the East and honored for the evening. It is interesting to note that the Worthy Patron was Master of Aurora Lodge #156 during their Golden Anniversary.

Grand Chapter has honored Dawn many times in our 54 years. We have had one Grand Matron, seven Grand Officers and now our Sister Lillian Harmes makes eight. We have had numerous District Instructors, Grand Representatives and Committee Members as well.

We have never failed to have a member who really wished to go into line – most of the time, more than one. We have shared our sorrows and joys and have stood by each other in adversity.

Our enthusiasm and life is constantly renewed by our younger members who follow the precepts and traditions we have passed on to them. Our own Worthy Matron, Josephine Kozacek, is a third generation to serve the Order of the Eastern Star as Worthy Matron.

The population of Aurora is now 152,000 and membership of Dawn Chapter is 561. From small beginnings, we have both grown to meet the future. We hope you will join us at the Turn of the Century to help us celebrate our Diamond Jubilee – we'll be waiting for you. *You never get a second chance to make a good first impression.*

Was the Last Supper a Passover Seder?

To accurately deal with this question, we need to review a few facts about Passover and the ancient Hebrews that you may have learned as a child in Sunday School. The story of Passover begins with Joseph of the Coat of Many Colors who was sold into Egypt by his brothers, later his father Jacob and his brothers and their families moved to Egypt during a famine in Canaan (known as Israel today) and prospered when they discovered that Joseph had become an advisor to the Pharaoh. Several generations after Joseph lived there was a new Pharaoh who no longer cared for the Hebrews and decided to enslave them. After about 400 years as slaves in Egypt the conditions had become more and more unbearable for the enslaved Hebrews.

Finally, Moses arose to help. He stepped down from the Palace and reached out to the enslaved Hebrews. As a baby Moses was found floating in basket in the bullrushes. He was rescued and adopted by an Egyptian princess, who many scholars believe to have been Hatshepsut, the only surviving child of Thutmose, whose reign began approximately in 1526 B.C.E. (Before Common Era) – the year Moses was born.

You may also remember from Sunday School learning about Moses confronting the Pharaoh with a message from the Lord of, “Let my people go.” Of course, it wasn’t quite that simple. The final persuasion was a series of Plagues which you may recall. (Anyone remember how many there were?) 8, 10, 12?

Just for fun, can you name the Plagues? (blood, frogs, lice, beasts, cattle disease, boils, hail, locusts, darkness, and finally, death of the Firstborn (where the term Passover first shows up.)

The term Passover refers to when the Angel of Death came for all the first-borns in Egypt, and the Hebrews used sheep’s blood to mark their doors and doorframes so that Death would Pass-over their homes, see the blood and NOT take any Hebrew first-borns.

Within hours of the Pass-over by the Angel of Death, Pharaoh said the Hebrews could leave. They had a quick simple, final meal (1st Passover or Pesach in Hebrew) including because of the rush unleavened bread called matzah, loaded up their possessions, joined up with Moses, and headed eastward as fast as they could towards the Sea of Reeds (NOT the Red Sea). The Exodus had started and they were returning to their ancestral home of Canaan which was later to be renamed Israel. It was not a short trip but eventually (apx 39 years later) they got there and settled in.

Originally, Passover night was a rather informal affair. There was no ornate Passover plate, no book of prayers and blessings like those used today.

Instead in ancient times each father would teach his child about the Exodus in his own way and with his own words, while the children spontaneously asked questions.

In those times the Passover Seder or supper initially served as a means for performing four Biblical rituals: 1) To eat the paschal (sheep or lamb) offering, 2) to eat this offering with bitter herbs, 3) to eat unleavened bread(matza), and 4) to tell the story of the Exodus from Egypt.

It was after the destruction of the Temple, the Passover Seder got its name and evolved into its current form.

As the Hebrew people (today known as the Jewish people) usually do, they created a Holiday with a special meal to celebrate the Exodus from the slavery of Egypt.

In the two thousand years since, Passover has maintained these same basic elements, but also added a few more additions which include: a bit more liturgy (with questions) and songs, wine, hors d’oeuvres, relishes, and more cooked food items.

Was the Last Supper a Passover Seder?

Many people believe that Jesus’ Last Supper was a Seder, the ritual meal held in celebration of the Jewish holiday of Passover. And indeed, according to the Gospel of Mark 14:12, Jesus prepared for the Last Supper on the “first day of Unleavened Bread, when they sacrificed the Passover lamb.” If Jesus and his disciples who were Jewish gathered together to eat soon after the Passover lamb was sacrificed, it stands to reason it was the Passover meal. And if they ate the Passover sacrifice, they must have held a Seder.

Three out of four of the canonical Gospels (Matthew, Mark and Luke) agree that the Last Supper was held only after the Jewish holiday had begun. Moreover, one of the best known and painstakingly detailed studies of the Last Supper—Joachim Jeremias’s book *The Eucharistic Words of Jesus*—lists no fewer than 14 distinct parallels between the Last Supper tradition and the Passover Seder.

Jesus was born, lived and died a Jew and his life as recorded in the Christian bible includes celebrations and traditions that support his lifelong Jewish connection. For example, when the Christian bible speaks of the presentation of the baby Jesus in the Temple eight days after his birth, historians recognize this event as the Brit Milah or circumcision ceremony. Then, as a young teen, Jesus is described as having preached in the Temple – an event that speaks to the coming-of-age Bar Mitzvah ceremony.

Throughout his life, Jesus emphasized his adherence to basic Jewish traditions, so it is not at all unusual that many historians believe that Jesus’ “Last Supper” was the traditional Passover Seder meal.

E is for her **EYES** with love-light shining,



Saturdays were spent baking at least 20 loaves of bread; dozens and dozens of kolaches, cookies, cinnamon rolls and biscuits.

In addition to Mary cooking, baking, doing laundry, cleaning house and canning for the family of 18, she also helped milk the cows, clean the barn, slop the pigs, butcher the chickens and livestock and harvest the hay and corn.

She had over 150 Grandchildren, Great Grandchildren and several Great Great Grandchildren when she passed away of kidney failure at the age of 82.



This lovely woman is the reason I am in Grand Line today. She is a fantastic role model and, I think, has given me shoes too big to fill. She and Ed Peterson presided over the "Starlight" session. She, like a lot of other WGMs, tried her best to unite the metro area with the other areas of the state with her "Stars Across Colorado" Grand Family in 1994-1995.

The capital of Oregon is Salem and its largest city is Portland. Oregon is bordered by Washington to the

North, Idaho to the east, Nevada and California to the south and the Pacific Ocean to the west. Mount Hood is the highest point in Oregon. The Virginia General Assembly was established in July 1619, making it the oldest law-making body in North America. During the Civil War, Virginia was split when the state government joined the Confederacy, but the northwestern counties wanted to remain with the Union, helping to form the state of West Virginia in 1863. In 2007, Virginia celebrated its

quadracentennial, marking 400 years since the Jamestown Colony was established.

Historical landmarks in Virginia include Shenandoah National Park, Arlington National Cemetery, George Washington's home at Mount Vernon, Thomas Jefferson's Monticello and iconic Charlottesville plantation, Jamestown Settlement, Colonial Williamsburg, Luray Caverns, Busch Gardens, and Manassas National Battlefield just to name a few. There is so much history in Virginia, you can definitely pick and choose to suit your own preferences.

Its capital and largest city is Boise.

Idaho is predominantly known for its potatoes, but Idaho is also home to the world's largest factory for barrel cheese, the raw product for processed cheese, located in Gooding, Idaho. It has a capacity of 120,000 metric tons per year of barrel cheese. Idaho is also home to Hewlett-Packard's LaserJet printer production.

Interesting sites in Idaho include: Shoshone Falls, considered the "Niagara of the West" is 212 feet high, 45 feet higher than Niagara Falls and flows over a rim nearly one thousand feet in width; Bear Lake, also known as "The Caribbean of the Rockies"; Snake River, the longest tributary of the Columbia River, and the largest North American river that empties into the Pacific Ocean; Craters of the Moon National Monument; Ernest Hemingway's final resting place and Memorial.

The "Believe and Capture Your Dreams!" 119th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Idaho will be held in Moscow, Idaho June 11-14 at the Best Western Plus University Inn where Deborah Arnold and Bill Tuggle will be presiding.

ILLINOIS

Friendship Night at Sunshine 53 also afforded WGP Keith Hoey and Escort Shelley Hoey to commission the next Grand Representative of Illinois in Colorado by surprising Larry Bonds of Edith 61.

Illinois was the 21st state admitted to the Union in 1818. Its largest city is Chicago and its Capital is Springfield. Illinois is in the Midwest region of the United States bordered by Missouri and Iowa on the west, Wisconsin on the north, Indiana on the east and Kentucky on the southeast and south. Three U.S. presidents were elected while living in Illinois: Abraham Lincoln, Ulysses S Grant and Barack Obama. Ronald Reagan, while living in California when elected, was born and raised in Illinois. Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum in Springfield, Ulysses S Grant Home State Historic Site, and Barack Obama Presidential Center in Chicago headline the attractions in Illinois. Other popular attractions are the Navy Pier, "The Bean " in Millennium Park, Michigan Ave and the Magnificent Mile and Wrigley Field, the second oldest MLB ballpark still in use today (built in 1914).

DELAWARE

We are now visiting Delaware, the first state admitted to the Union, December 7, 1787. Colorado's newest Grand



Representative of this jurisdiction is Debby Kier, Manzanita Chapter No. 85, Littleton. Delaware is in the Mid-Atlantic region, bordering Pennsylvania to the north, New Jersey and the Atlantic Ocean to the east and Maryland to the south and west. The Capital is Dover, and the largest city is Wilmington. The state takes its name from the nearby Delaware River, which in turn derived its name from Thomas West, 3rd Baron De La Warr who was the ruling governor of the Colony of Virginia at the time of the first exploration of the river. Delaware is the second smallest state and least populated state in America however, *The First State* is

the domicile of over half of all NYSE-listed businesses and over three-fifths of the Fortune 500. Delaware is also a tax-free state.

Stretching much of the length of Delaware's 28 miles of Atlantic coastline are white-sand beaches such listed at the top of the list of "what Delaware is famous for", along with Fort Delaware State Park, Harbor defense facility, Nemours Mansion and Gardens and the Museum as Rehoboth, Dewey, Bethany and Lewes, being the most popular among tourists. Dover International Speedway is and garden in Wilmington.

NEW JERSEY

Another Mid-Atlantic state is the Province of New Jersey, bordered by New York to the north and east, the Atlantic Ocean on the east, southeast & south, Delaware on the southwest and Pennsylvania on the west. The third state admitted to the Union December

18, 1787; the first state to ratify the Bill of Rights in November 1789; is the fifth smallest state and the 11th most populous state. New Jersey's state Capital is Trenton with the largest city being Newark. New Jersey is the state Sister Carol Heagney, Loyalty No. 145, Westminster, will be representing in Colorado.

British and American armies crossed New Jersey numerous times during the American Revolutionary War and several pivotal battles took place within the state. Because of this, New Hersey today is often referred to as "The Crossroads of the American Revolution". Morristown has been called "The Military Capital of the American Revolution" due to General George Washington establishing the Continental Army's winter headquarters there.

The most visited place in New Jersey is Atlantic City, known for its gambling casinos and the home of the Miss America pageant. The famous wood-plank Boardwalk and Gardner's Basin are the top waterfront attractions in Atlantic City. Other top attractions include Jersey City's Liberty State Park where the 9/11 Memorial is located, Spring Lake, Hoboken, Cape May, Wildwood, Princeton, and Ocean City.

The 151st "Unity thru Simplicity" Grand Chapter Session @ Caesar's Hotel, Atlantic City, will be held May 23-25, 2022, where Daria Hamm, MWGM* and Bruce Zielinski, MWGP* will preside.

RHODE ISLAND

A second commission was presented @ Loyalty's Official Visit to Krista Shaner. Krista is the newest Grand Representative of Rhode Island in Colorado. Rhode Island is the last of the original colonies that established the United States. It was admitted to the Union May 29, 1790. It is the smallest U.S. state by area and the seventh-least populous, but is the second-most densely populated after New Jersey. Rhode Island is located in the New England region bordered by Massachusetts to the north and east, the Atlantic Ocean to the south and Connecticut to the west. It also shares a small maritime border with New York. Providence is the Capital.



The First Baptist Church of Providence is the oldest Baptist church in America, founded by Roger Williams in 1638, two years after he was banished from the Massachusetts Bay Colony for his religious views. Williams settled at the top of Narragansett Bay, where he named the site Providence, "having a sense of God's merciful providence unto me in my distress", becoming a place of religious freedom where all were welcome. Newport is also the home of the Touro Synagogue, believed to be the first Synagogue with the U.S.

The first fully automated post office in the country is located in Providence. The state capital building is made of white Georgian marble. On top is the world's fourth largest self-supporting marble dome. It houses the Rhode Island Charter granted by King Charles and the Brown University charter, along with other state treasurers. Other historic sites include many mansions in Newport such as Belcourt Castle, The Breakers and Mable House.

The Crowne Plaza Hotel in Warwick will host Rhode Island Grand Chapter October 6-8, 2022. The "Guiding Lights" session will be presided over by WGM Cindy-Lou Silva and WGP Keith Moan.

ALBERTA, CANADA

At the April 12, 2022 Stated Meeting of Garden City No. 3, Louise Nincehelter was commissioned the newest Grand Representative of Alberta in Colorado.



The Wild Rose Country of Alberta is a province in western Canada, home to the gorgeous Canadian Rockies, the amazing cities of Calgary and the capital city of Edmonton, and a diverse landscape

that ranges from prairies to badlands to seemingly endless forests. Alberta is bordered by the U.S. state of Montana to the South, British Columbia to the west, Saskatchewan to the east and the Northwest Territories to the North.

Mount Columbia @ 12,294 feet, in the Rocky Mountains is Alberta's highest point, and numerous other peaks exceed 11,000 feet. A narrow foothill zone flanks the mountains to the east. Beyond that, the interior plains fall from over 3,000 feet in the southwest to below 1,000 feet in the northeast, where ancient Precambrian rocks outcrop in the Canadian Shield. Outliers of higher ground include the Cypress and Swan hills and the Caribou Mountains.

The Columbia Icefield is the source of two of Alberta's major rivers, the Athabasca and the North Saskatchewan. The first flows northeast to Lake Athabasca, where it becomes the Slave River. It is then joined by the Peace River and drains north toward the Arctic Ocean.

Many of the top attractions in Alberta are a testament to the power of nature, from the ancient glaciers that can still be found on top of the Rocky Mountains to the canyons, waterfalls, and lakes formed by their predecessors. But for those who prefer a more urban experience, there's no shortage of impressive attractions in the province's two major cities.

"Come to the Ceilidh" Grand Chapter Session, June 2-5, 2022 in Old College, Olds, AB, where you will find WGM Lorna Richmond and WGP Tim Cameron presiding. Alberta just resumed meeting in-person December 1, 2021. WGM Lorna wrote in her first newsletter article that when she and WGP Tim "dreamed about what our year would look like, little did we know that we would be heading into such uncharted waters. We are members of a unique group of Worthy Grand Matrons and Worthy Grand Patrons who have had to do things completely differently while also forging new ways of staying in touch with everyone." Their Installation of Officers along with half their year has been done virtually through "ZOOM" meetings and events, with an occasional in-person event.
